What an incredible year it has been! I'd like to thank the Prosser EDA board for all their efforts over this past year and encourage them to continue serving at the board and committee level. The board consists of a diverse group of leaders in our community. Their knowledge is instrumental in guiding economic growth and development based on the 2012-2022 long range strategic plan. Prosser EDA's committees: Organization, Special Projects, Business Development & Recruitment, Water and Housing are taking a look at opportunities, analyzing and creating solutions to advance economic development. There are openings to serve on each committee and anyone with an interest is encouraged to join.

The theme for this year's Annual Meeting is focused on Agriculture - a constant strength of our community. When our growers have a good year, it has a trickle down effect on our local businesses, i.e., additional equipment, supplies and services are purchased because of the increased disposal income. Thanks goes to our farming businesses that keep their purchases local.

The following statistics are from the 2012 Census of Agriculture, which is conducted every five years by the USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service:

- The United States has 2.1 million farms down 4.3 percent from 2007, continuing a long-term trend of fewer farms.
- In 2012, the market values of crops, livestock, and total agricultural products were each record highs.
- Per farm agricultural sales averaged \$187,000 in 2012. This was an increase of more than \$52,000 (or 39%) over 2007.
- In 2012, the average age of principal farm operators was 58.3 years and continues a 30 year trend of steady increase in age.
- 1.0 million operators considered farming their principal occupation in 2012.

And finally, a bit of humor from an Old Farmer's Advice article to keep in mind this year:

- Keep skunks and bankers at a distance.
- Do not corner something that you know is meaner than you!
- When you wallow with pigs, expect to get dirty.
- Don't judge folks by their relatives.

- Lettin' the cat outta the bag is a whole lot easier than puttin' it back in.




Community Grant Writer Program


To date, the Grant Writer program has generated \$16.08 for every \$1 invested. In 2013 the Grant Writer Program generated awards from the USDA - Rural Business Enterprise Grant for equipment for the Walter Clore Wine and Culinary Center and Northwest Farm Credit Services for a new floor in the Prosser City library. Thank you to Sue Jetter, the City of Prosser, PMH Medical Center and the Port of Benton for investing in the program to assist funding within our community.

Growth in Prosser

Prosser's new construction, while not as high as 2012, came in strong at \$12 million. Healthcare services have continued to expand; we now have a Kadlec medical office in Vintner's Gateway. McDonalds recently expanded and remodeled, Bethel Church is building off Gap Road, and the Snoqualmie tasting room changed their name to 14 Hands, had a major remodel and expanded their tanks to 750,000 gallons. The downtown core continues renovation projects with \$1.3 million in storefront façade improvements.






